Senate Bill 333 which extends the State Use Law and includes the wording from Kathy's Bill creating Disability Hiring Preference passed the House. We are now waiting to see if the Senate will concur on the addition of Kathy's bill wording or will go to conference committee.

The final date for bills to be out of the second house is Thursday, March 28th. No committee hearings on the bills tracked here are listed for any hearings next week. calendars.

The legislature is meeting Pro Forma (they meet register their presence) today and will not be in session Friday, March 29th. They are back in session on Monday, April 1st through April 5th which is deadline for consideration of all bills and the first adjournment.

The legislature will back for the Veto Session on April 29th and 30th.
